

FRONT VIEW OF KILMAINHAM PRISON.





IRISHMEN AND IRISHWOMEN: In the name of God and of the dead generations from which she receives her old tradition of nationhood, Ireland through us, summons her children to her flag

Irish Republican Brotherhood, and through her own military organisations, the Irish Volunteers and the Irish Citizen Army, having patiently perfected her discipline, having resolutely waited for the right moment to revel itself, she now seizes that moment, and, supported by her exiled children, in America and by gallant allies in Europe, but relying in the first on her own strength, she strikes in full confidence of victory.

control of Irish destinies, to be sovereign and indefeasible. The long usurpation of that right by a foreign people and government has not extinguished the right, nor can it ever be extinguished except by the destruction of the Irish people. In every generation, the Irish people have asserted their right to national freedom and sovereignty; six times during the past three hundred years they have asserted it in arms. 





EXCERPT FROM BULLETIN ISSUED BI P. H. PEARSE ON 28th APRIL, 1916.

"I desire now, lest I may not have an opportunity later, to pay homage to the gallantry of the soldiers of Irish Freedom who have, during the past four days, been writing with fire and steel the most glorious chapter in the later history of Ireland. Justice can never be done to their heroism, to their discipline, to their gay and unconquerable spirit in the midst of peril and death.

"Let me, who have led them into this, speak in my own name and in my fellow-commanders' names, and in the name of Ireland present and to ome, their praise and ask those who come after them to remember them.

"For four days they have fought and toiled, almost without cessation, almost without sleep, and in the intervals of fighting they have sung songs of he freedom of Ireland. No man has complained; no man has asked 'Why?' Each individual has spent himself, happy to pour out his strength for Ireland and for Freedom. If they do not win the fight, they will at least have deserved to win it. But win it they will, although they may win it in death. Already they have done a great thing. They have redeemed Dublin from many shames, and made her name splendid among the names of cities.

"If I were to mention names of individuals my list would be a long one

"If we accomplish no more than we have a complished, I am satisfied. I am satisfied that we have saved Ireland's herour"
